To Defend Immigrants is to Defend Us All

Trump's "shock and awe" campaign against immigrants, that began on day one, keeps expanding: The raids and mass round-ups, the threats to arrest public officials who fail to cooperate, sending military troops to the border, declaring a national emergency at the southern border, the plans to raid schools, hospitals and churches, setting up homeland security task forces in every state that bring together federal, state and local law enforcement – it all adds up to a rapidly developing police state that can be used against anyone.

Thousands across the country, many of whom are youth, are responding with marches and high school walkouts, gathering at public schools to defend immigrants and to keep ICE out, packing public hearings, forming rapid response networks, conducting Know Your Rights campaigns, and more. As one young woman in Chicago observed, "What has been special to witness is how quickly people have responded to protect their neighbors."



This kind of solidarity in the defense of immigrants is central to successfully resisting the dictatorship that Trump and his billionaire backers are trying to create.

If we normalize isolating and attacking immigrants or any group of people, this robs us of our humanity and em-

pathy and weakens everyone's rights, which in turn allows those in power to eliminate democracy for everyone. All of us are ultimately the target of the anti-immigrant campaign. Stop the Deportations!

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Black History Month 2025: Now More Than Ever! A holiday under attack should be celebrated by all

This year, Black History Month is under attack - and is needed more than ever.

Created in 1926 by the great historian Carter G. Woodson, the celebration each February of African American life and history has been officially recognized since 1976. That year, a Republican President - Gerald Ford - issued a proclamation. This year, the federal government under white nationalist president Donald Trump is moving to end all Black History Month celebrations by federal agencies.

The Association for the Study of African American Life and History has proclaimed this year's theme to be "African Americans and Labor." This theme is especially fitting for

Black History Month 2025 is taking place in the midst of a vicious, cynical campaign by the Trump administration to incite hatred against African Americans and other people of color.

From the time of slavery until today, Black workers have comprised the heart of the U.S. working class. From colonial times, the attacks on the working class as a whole have

always started as attacks on Black workers. Throughout our history, when Black workers have been pushed backward, everyone ultimately suffered. When Black workers have advanced, everyone has moved forward.

It was only after the abolition of chattel slavery that there was any possibility of a credible trade union movement in the United States. As long as Black workers could be forced to work without any wages whatsoever, it was almost impossible for white workers to significantly increase their own wages.

In the industrial era, many trade unions especially in the most skilled occupations refused to admit Black workers, helping to lock Black workers into the most impoverished section of the working class, ensuring privileges for white workers.

Today, vast changes in the economy are destroying the old jobs. This creates the possibility of a common struggle against the tiny handful of billionaires who rule this country - a struggle across color lines.

During this Black History Month 2025, it's time to re-assert the truth that Black workers have always comprised the very heart of the

The Urgency of Uniting to Tackle Climate Destroyers

"Trump's reelection is something we need to be radicalized by. Go out and flood the streets . . . use every possible tool [to leverage the urgency of climate change]. As democratic citizens we have an obligation to act..." — Greta Thunberg, worldrenowned climate activist.

In the U.S. alone, year 2024 saw 27 weather/ climate confirmed disaster events with damages over \$1 billion each, resulting in at least 568 deaths according to NOAA. This is up from an annual average of 9 events from 1980-2024.

Hurricane Helene was stronger and wetter because of global warming. In Southern California, hot, dry, windy conditions contributing to the wildfires were 35 percent more likely because of human-caused climate change, says the Climate Science Consortium World Weather Attribution. Fire weather will intensify as the world grows warmer.

First Street, a climate modeling firm, says more than five million people in the U.S. will move from areas affected by climate change

this year. Over 52 million are expected to flee the Atlantic and Gulf coasts and fire-prone areas in the West over the next 30 years.

Millions have nowhere to go. With wealth inequality rising, and nearly half of Americans unable to afford a \$400 emergency, extreme weather events will exacerbate the human cri-

As thousands remain homeless and vulnerable to the negative effects of global warming, Trump is doubling down on opening new leases to fossil fuel corporations. He has floated the idea to abolish FEMA, forcing each state to deal with the crisis. The billionaires ruling Congress want to cut trillions in social spending, including clean energy, but not their billions in government subsidies.

The urgent need to unite to stop the billionaires from destroying any chance we have for a future could not be clearer.

As the late Mike Davis, author of Ecology of Fear: Los Angeles and the Imagination of Disaster, said, "I've seen ordinary people do the most heroic things. When you've had the privilege

LGBTQ+ Rights are Human Rights

The massive disruption we have seen since Trump took office is being led by the billionaires behind Project 2025, using Trump to do it. Trump's flurry of executive orders is designed to overwhelm, demoralize, disorient and strike fear into the American People. The immediate attack is aimed primarily at transgender people, immigrants, Black Americans, and other marginalized communities.

With regard to gender issues, one of his first signed orders states: "It is the policy of the United States to recognize two sexes, male and female." It orders federal agencies to "enforce laws governing sex-based rights, protections, opportunities, and accommodations" using this narrow definition of gender, and to "end the Federal funding of gender ideology." Gender-affirming care for minors is threatened. It is being characterized as "child abuse" to sound more empathetic. By referring to gender affirming care as 'gender ideology' this non-scientific terminology does not recognize the diversity of human biology, but makes it sound like a belief system.

"Some of the most immediate impacts will likely be felt by the more than 2,000 transgender people currently held in federal custody. The order calls for forcing transgender women into men's prisons and detention centers, putting them at a severely heightened risk of sexual assault", says the ACLU. The order also mandates withdrawing trans health care from incarcerated people.

Other effects on trans people include being unable to change gender on documents, and being banned from the military.

Rep. Sarah McBride, the first openly trans member of Congress, has stated, "When they're going after trans people, with their right hand they're picking the pocket of American workers, they're fleecing seniors, they're undermining unions. And this is all part of

that politics of misdirection and distraction and division."

Andrea Ritchie, the co-founder of Interrupting Criminalization, said, "We owe it to trans youth and communities to push back with all our might, to refuse to deny care, to

challenge administrators who try to shut it down, to support providers under attack, and to contribute to mutual aid efforts that will ensure continuity of care." We all need to see that defending LGBTQ+ people from harm is in the best interests of all of us.

'We Will Not Leave Gaza Whatsoever,' says Gaza Resident

U.S. President Donald Trump proposed that the U.S. take control of and redevelop the Gaza Strip, forcing the residents into surrounding countries, less than a month after a ceasefire deal.

Trump's suggestion sparked criticism across the world - and was met with disbelief and outrage among Gazans.

Israel has killed over 46,000 Palestinians since Oct. 7, 2023, according to the Gazan Health Ministry. Israel claims the continued mass killing was retaliation against Hamas for the over 1,100 Israelis killed and over 200 hostages taken on Oct. 7, 2023.

But Palestinian communities knew since 2023 that the genocide by the Israeli government was never about Hamas or the attack on

"They use Hamas as an excuse to wipe out the whole state of Palestine, the whole country, because of a very small minority," Palestinian activist Hanna Khalaf said in October

In August 2023 Human Rights Watch declared that 2022 was the "deadliest year for Palestinian children," and that 2023 was on pace to match that number even before the genocide began.

"Regardless if Hamas is a thing or not, if we resist, we're always going to be labeled as terrorists," Khalaf said. "No person is ever going to look at our side and see the years of occupation, the use of genocide, the years of oppression going on to the Palestinians."

But even as Trump promises to take their land after their homes were destroyed by Israel, the Gazan people still stand in resistance.

"We will not leave Gaza whatsoever," Gazan resident Iyam Jahjouh told CNN on Feb. 5, 2024, "even though the great destruction and everything and even the weather we are staying here in our destroyed homes, we are steadfast in our land and we are not giving a damn to his (Trump's) statements."

Attack on Birthright Citizenship Pathways of Indigenous Prophecy

In this time of shock and awe from executive orders flying off Trump's desk, there has been no greater confusion for most Americans than the attack on birthright citizenship for Indigenous in the United States.

More confusing in the last few weeks are the ICE roundups of Navajo citizens at their homes and workplaces. Following these invasions, letters from other Nations were immediately being shared all over social media warning their people to know their rights and to carry their identification with them at all

Don't be baffled by the challenge of Indigenous citizenship. The Oligarchy only sees the land they stand on. The sacred, sovereign

land. The land that is rich in oil, natural gas, and many other resources.

The Trump administration will continue the plan that he attempted in his first presidency with Chaco Canyon, to steal sacred lands for resource exploitation. He has to keep his supporters, the destructionists, satisfied.

As in his first term, Trump is going after the 14th Amendment questioning birthright citizenship, not only to continue ethnic cleansing as he terrorizes immigrants, but to create a pathway to gain access to Tribal lands.

In the time of the 14th Amendment, Indigenous were not subject to the jurisdiction of the U.S. They were not allowed to become citizens until 1924. If birthright citizenship were stripped, how would treaties stand?

With a bit of relief, U.S. District Judge Deb-

orah Boardman recently rejected Trump's order to reinterpret birthright citizenship stating, "In fact, no court in the country has ever endorsed the president's interpretation. This court will not be the first."

Tribal nations know who they are and what path they have inherited. There are prophecies like the Seventh Generations preparing the first peoples for these times. They know the land where their feet belong. They don't live in the illusion of colonization or need to be told who they are. They are organized. They are ready.
