Don't Steal Our Shelter!

Groups vow to keep organizing

Emboldened by a recent Supreme Court ruling that cities can now take homeless people's tents and possessions and harass and arrest them, whether they have shelter to offer or not, California's Democratic Governor Newsom, who supported this cruel ruling, has now ordered cities to step up sweeps of encampments and the towing of vehicle homes, creating greater havoc in homeless communities, prompting more calls for solutions by the displaced and their advocates.

In Sacramento, the city cut off water to the independent sanctioned RV community Camp Resolution in the midst of an historic heat wave, and then brutally evicted its majority female, elder and disabled residents. One of those displaced is Jeanne, a violinist, described by Crystal Sanchez of the Sacramento Homeless Union, as "a beautiful musician, beyond talented, who plays at local

venues with bands." Many are now in medical crisis and without shelter. Lawsuits against the city have been launched.

In Los Angeles, Oakland, Berkeley, Fresno, Santa Cruz and other California cities, removals of unhoused communities are ramping up. People ask: 'Where Do We Go?' and 'Move On to Where?'

In San Francisco, the mayor proposed a new ordinance to fast-track the towing of RVs and other vehicles, which house hundreds of people, many of them families. Rallies to 'Stop the Poor Tows' were held in protest of this mean law. Dozens of RV residents and advocates spoke before the SFMTA, the body that would oversee the removals. Despite heartfelt pleas and testimonies, the ordinance passed. Here are words of some who spoke:

Lukas Illa, Human Right Organizer with the Coalition on Homelessness: "Working people with vehicular housing are being pushed from

street to street where they face harassment from both city workers and neighbors alike."

Santos: "I want housing and nada mas! I'm fed up at how I'm treated, dealing with the cops and the city. The solution is housing for everybody."

Michigan's Prescient Lesson Vote While You Still Can!!!

National, statewide, and local candidates deluge voters with the upcoming November elections. Yet not enough attention is given to the threat to our Democratic rights as we've known them.

Ask Michigan how Benton Harbor lost its precious public park, how Pontiac lost almost all its Public Services (Police, Fire Department, and EMS), how Detroit was forced into bankruptcy while its world class Municipal Water System was regionalized. Lastly, how Flint became a victim of the infamous water crisis, derived from the Michigan Emergency Manager (dictatorship) law. The Michigan Center for Public Policy designed the blueprint for that law. The seizure of public assets (aka privatization) was and is the end game. Governed by edict, this model has metastasized into the Heritage Foundation's Project 2025.

While Michigan's Emergency Managers were dispatched to reign supreme over targeted Michigan cities and school boards, Project 2025 proposes that the entire Federal bureaucracy be placed under direct presidential control. Now a President becomes Dictator in Chief, with already broad immunity, courtesy

of the Supreme Court. With a roll back in protections from EPA, for example, how does one grieve the poisoning of water such as in Flint — which still does not have clean water.

The notorious Heritage Foundation uses a narrative of blaming immigrants to justify its dystopian agenda, just as the Michigan Center

for Public Policy used African-American elected officials to pedal its corporate objectives.

All who care about defending and expanding our freedoms dare not avoid using the VOTE, while we can. This along with other social justice activities is one tool in the toolbox to secure political power.

Abortion Tragedies and a Georgia Victory

Two Black women recently died in Georgia because they were unable to obtain basic abortion health care due to hospitals and doctors fearing prosecution under that state's six-week abortion ban. Democracy is strangled as people's bodily autonomy is taken away.

However, Fulton County Judge Robert McBurney struck down Georgia's abortion ban as unconstitutional in October, leaving an earlier law allowing abortion up to 22 weeks in effect. The judge wrote in his ruling that "liberty in Georgia" includes "the power of a woman to control her own body . . . and to reject state

interference with her healthcare choices." The judge wrote that "women are not some piece of collectively owned community property the disposition of which is decided by majority vote."

One of the reasons victory came about was because grassroots organizations such as Sister Song Women of Color Reproduction Justice Collective and others filed a lawsuit against the State of Georgia, and the county judge took a firm stand on the side of justice. "Georgia has an opportunity to ensure we are able to live beyond tragic circumstances, to ensure that physicians will be able to act in their expertise, and to ensure that no one else

has to die unnecessarily," said the director of the Feminist Women's Healthcare Center.

The struggle continues. The ruling will be appealed by the State.

This case reveals who we elect at the local and state levels is critically important, and when they do not represent our wishes, we organize to oppose them, and victory is possible.

Editor's note: As we go to print, the Supreme Court has put on hold the abortion rights victory until the State of Georgia's appeal has been heard.

Peace is a Survival Issue for Humanity
